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INTRODUCTION

The Centre for Cultural Partnerships (CCP) was launched in 2008 by then Deputy Prime Minister, the Hon. Julia Gillard. As a local/global arts and cultural hub it provides teaching, research and partnership programs focusing on the role of the arts in strengthening communities, building leadership capacity, promoting social inclusion and encouraging inter-cultural dialogue and cultural renewal.

In October 2010, the Centre as part of the Faculty of the VCA and Music, University of Melbourne, presents Australia's first Executive Education Community Cultural Development (CCD) Leadership program with a focus on *Developing and Managing Creative Partnerships*. Twenty nominated participants from across Australasia will discuss and explore 21st century requirements for leadership and new opportunities for cross-sectoral partnerships in CCD practice.

PARTICIPANTS

You are an individual community arts practitioner or artist; managing a small-medium community arts organisation; a local government arts/cultural manager/ officer or an arts leader from indigenous or refugee communities. The program is directed towards meeting the training/executive education needs for people working in community-based arts activities. Specifically, it will assist you meet the demands and challenges in the critical area of *Developing and Managing Creative Partnerships*. Leadership in community cultural development for the 21st century calls for not only arts discipline-specific skills, but also a number of other broader-based art and cultural enterprise skills, which may include:

- interdisciplinary innovation, cross-arts and cross-sectoral
- the ability to establish and maintain collaborative networks to foster mutually productive relationships
- intercultural dialogue, exchange and development
- the capacity to work in partnership to address a range of social and public policy agendas/issues
- futures thinking, strategic planning and problem-solving techniques

PROGRAM CONTEXT

A three-day residential intensive, this strongly focused and inspiring program is based on a framework that sees partnership as integral to community cultural development. The strength of this practice lies in its ability to establish creative capacity-building collaborations with community to foster social change and cultural enterprise. The program delivery mode as a learning model of inquiry has been informed by the principles of collaborative learning that researcher Peter Senge and others have developed. Senge, in his book *The Fifth Discipline* (1990) describes this learning as a process:

"...where people continually expand their capacity to create the results they truly desire, where new and expansive patterns of thinking are nurtured, where collective aspiration is set free, and where people are continually learning to see the whole together."



LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of this program, participants will have:

- a deeper understanding of the changing context of CCD practice
- appreciate the 'guiding principles' and key factors behind effective partnerships, the different forms of cross-sector partnerships, their value and applicability to different circumstances, with specific analysis of individual participants' working contexts
- gained new insights into leadership values, principles and strategies relevant to their work in the community sector and to building community sustainability
- established a network of peers with whom they can continue to liaise and share continued learning



THE VENUE
