Culture Comes Home to Melbourne

It is 10 years since the Melbourne based Cultural Development Network published *'The Fourth Pillar of Sustainability'* (Hawkes, 2001) which went on to spread around the world as a definitive text on the relationship of cultural policies with economic, social and environmental policies; the quadruple-bottom line.

The 60-page book made its journey of adoption all the way through to Mexico City, where the international peak body of local government, UCLG (United Cities and Local Governments), declared in November 2010 that 'Culture is the Fourth Pillar of Sustainable Development.'

In October 2011 local government leaders from across the Asia-Pacific will gather in Melbourne to discuss the important and emerging cultural dimension of local government policy. They will attend a one-day conference to examine the impact of the UCLG declaration that culture is the 'fourth pillar' of sustainable development.

The author Jon Hawkes is delighted and surprised that his ideas have been adopted at a global level and said 'Bugger! My bet was on the Greeks – I was sure they'd be the first to pick up on the pillars metaphor.'

He went on to acknowledge the work of UCLG and that 'Jordi Pascual, within UCLG in Barcelona, has been working for a decade to achieve this global proclamation. "If something is worth doing, it's worth doing really slowly". That level of commitment to an idea is remarkable. As someone with a level of responsibility for the idea, I commend his commitment, and look forward to its declaration stimulating interesting action.'
